#### From the President

The UNAAWA started 2025 with much to look forward to. Our Executive committee met in February and continue our plans for events over this year.

It always heartens me to reflect upon the quality of the people whom I serve alongside with, all of whom altruistically set aside their precious time and effort to do good for society.

2025 will see continuance and expansion of the UNAAWA's engagement for matters on Human Rights, Environment, Gender Equality, the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and Young Professionals, with events to be announced as they approach, continuing their efforts to build bonds and foster long-term relationships.

As we follow the news, we see conflict, international tension, deterioration of climate and with human rights being negatively affected. Distressing as these developments are, the UNAAWA works to counter these trends by establishing multilateralism, to build bonds and foster long-term bonds based on mutual respect and understanding.

These events go a long way to show that no matter how different we may all be, we share far more in common than what divides us. Respect, understanding and acceptance is universally understood. Though our efforts at these events may seem small, the principles we seek establish are universal, and much larger. It is through such efforts that misunderstanding and causes of conflict may be alleviated.

On 22 February, I attended the 2025 WA Celebration of the first ICH Spring Festival Temple Fair & Gala. The event was jointly organised by the Australian Chinese Women's Federation Inc, Australian Central China Association, Cockburn Chinese Community Association, and the Western Australia Zhejiang Association. with participation and cultural performances by groups from India, Bhutan, Vietnam, and Malaysia. More than 700 people attended this celebration, and I was honoured to present awards at the event.

On 15 March, I attended an event organised by the Bhutanese Chamber of Commerce. The event was presented to support and introduce "The Messenger" i.e. Jamyang Wangchuk, to the Western Australian community. For the past 3 years, Jamyang Wangchuk, a Bhutanese filmmaker, adventurer and an environmental advocate, has been collecting Himalayan glacier ice water from Bhutan, Nepal & India to bring attention to the dying glaciers. Jamyang will be biking from WA to Canberra, and at the Australian Parliament House, he will read out letters written by the

children of Bhutan. I was honoured to meet Jamyang Wangchuk, and to see the Bhutanese cultural performances.

On 25 March, I attended the commemoration of the National Day of Greece, hosted the Consul of Greece in Perth Mrs Eleni Georgopoulou and her husband. In attendance were consuls, Members of Parliament and local government, representatives from government departments and many from the Greek community in WA. The cultural performances were excellent, and I was struck by how enthusiastic many were about the mission of the UN, regardless of their background or profession.

On 28 March, I attend the 15th Anniversary of the Western Australia Zhejiang Association and the 38th Anniversary of the WA-Zhejiang Sister-State Relationship Gala. The theme of this year's celebration was "A Legacy of Friendship and Growth" to highlight the shared achievements and close ties that have strengthened our communities. The Vice-Consul from the Chinese Consulate, Mr Liu Haitao attended along with Geoff Baker, Member for South Perth, amongst others. I was very proud that the President of the WA-Zhejiang Association is Lucia Chen, our UN Day Chair, and I was impressed by her achievements.

On 30 March, I attended the NAARI event organised by the Indian Society of WA to commemorate International Women's Day. The event saw speeches on the contribution of women in the Indian and other communities, and talks by Rebecca Ruiz Prinz on Plastic-Free July, cricketer Bhavi Devchand on women in sport and a presenter on her lived experience on domestic violence. I was heartened how community associations are raising awareness and working together to overcome these issues for the benefit of all, not just their communities. The event organiser was Mansi Zaveri from the UNAAWA Environment Committee, and I was impressed her achievements.

All the events I attended saw communities getting together and inviting people from other communities to join them in celebration, and this is what makes all these events so special.

The UNAAWA seeks to do a greater good for society, and for this purpose, we each volunteer our time and effort and work to achieve those goals. This is the spirit the UNAAWA seeks to develop and build - to Inform, Inspire and Engage, for the betterment of all.

# UNAAWA Human Rights Convenor Attends Operation Goldilocks Screening: A Call to Action against Child Trafficking

On March 5, 2025, Charlotte Moss, the Human Rights Convenor for the United Nations Association of Australia, Western Australia (UNAA WA), attended a private screening of "Operation Goldilocks," hosted by the non-profit organization Destiny Rescue. The event aimed to raise awareness about the pressing issue of child trafficking, particularly in Southeast Asia, where countless children are exploited for labor and sexual purposes. This screening served not only as a platform to showcase the film but also as a rallying point for advocates, policymakers, and the general public to engage with this critical humanitarian crisis.



Child trafficking is a rampant issue that transcends borders and threatens the future of vulnerable populations, especially in impoverished regions. According to the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, records a 25 per cent increase in the number of trafficking victims detected globally in 2022 compared to 2019 pre-pandemic figures. This shocking statistic underscores the need for immediate and concerted action to combat such a grave violation of human rights. "Operation Goldilocks" seeks to shed light on these harsh realities through a fictional narrative that poignantly

portrays the experiences of child victims and the challenges faced by those working to rescue and rehabilitate them.

Charlotte Moss's presence at the screening highlights the significance of this issue. As a human rights advocate, Moss understands that awareness is the first step toward action. She remarked, "Events like these are crucial for educating the public and rallying support for initiatives that combat trafficking. It is a collective responsibility to ensure that every child is protected and given a chance at a life free from exploitation." Moss' insights emphasize the importance of uniting various sectors—government, NGOs, and local communities—to create a multifaceted approach in addressing human trafficking.

While raising awareness is vital, it is equally important to translate that awareness into meaningful action. The film and the discussions that followed the screening sparked vital conversations about the ways both individuals and organizations can support Destiny Rescue in their efforts. In 2024 alone, Destiny Rescue has successfully rescued 1,876 children worldwide from the horrors of human trafficking and sexual exploitation. Many survivors, once rescued, dedicate their lives to helping others and inspiring positive change within their communities. Furthermore, these rescue operations have led to the apprehension of 288 perpetrators involved in trafficking and abuse, underscoring the significant impact of collective action in the fight against these heinous crimes.

In conclusion, Charlotte Moss's attendance at the private screening of "Operation Goldilocks" by Destiny Rescue is a critical reminder of the ongoing fight

against child trafficking. While the film serves to raise awareness, it is essential that we move beyond discussions to implement proactive measures. By fostering collaboration among all sectors of society and focusing on prevention strategies, we can create a future where children are safe from exploitation. Every effort

counts in this fight for human rights, and we must all play our part in ensuring that our collective voice leads to meaningful change.

From Sydney with the Tech Council of Australia, to Women in STEMM at CERI, and, most notably, Soroptimist International, the conversations were thought-provoking, insightful, and deeply necessary.



As AI and digital transformation reshape industries, it's important that women are engaged in these conversations—not just as participants, but as leaders, creators, and decision-makers. Whether in AI governance, trade, or STEMM entrepreneurship, diverse perspectives bring fresh ideas and ensure technology serves society in meaningful ways.

Well-attended by 120 guests including members of Soroptimist International and young girls from local high schools, some of the key themes highlighted by Dr Chong include:

- Women are instrumental in driving innovation When diverse voices shape technology, solutions that reflect the needs of a broader society can then be created
- Digital transformation is an evolving journey Al and emerging technologies are changing how we work and live. Ensuring they reflect real-world diversity is a shared responsibility.

#### **Community Partners**

#### City of Melville

City of Melville's engineering team has won a highly commended in the prestigious Institute of Public Works Engineering Australia (IPWEA) WA Awards for its clever 'giant bladder' system, diverting storm water that would previously have been wasted to practical use throughout the City.

The Evershed Sump Stormwater Harvesting and Reuse Project is one of two of the City's projects to reach the finals of the awards. It won highly commended in the Excellence in Water Projects Category.

The annual IPWEA awards showcase outstanding projects in the public works and local government sectors.

City of Melville's Manager Engineering, Kimberly Brosztl, explains the Evershed Sump project aligns with the City's sustainability goals because it reduces the City's reliance on groundwater and higher quality mains drinking and instead uses the recycled water for services like tree watering, road construction, and drain cleaning.

It also reduces the amount of stormwater entering the Swan River which reduces the risk of detrimental nutrient flow into the waterway.

The water at the Evershed Sump site on Marmion Street in Myaree is collected in a giant synthetic 'bladder' with 140,000 litres storage capacity. It's treated and tested and kept in the 'bladder' until needed, in a way that's cost effective and visually unobtrusive.

Trucks can pull up and fill up water tanks quickly and efficiently, thanks to a state-of-the-art pumping system.

Local community consultation was undertaken before the sump site's transformation and beautiful murals were incorporated into the final design of the fencing enclosing the sump basin.

#### Comments attributed to City of Melville Mayor Katy Mair:

"This project has delivered significant community benefits and we are extremely proud to have it recognised in this way," said Mayor Mair.

"It fits perfectly into our long-term goals which emphasise sustainable use of resources, adoption of a circular economy approach optimising waste reduction and resource recovery.

"It provides an alternative water supply for various activities, reducing the strain on potable water resources.

"It enhances the local community with attractive artwork along the extensive sump fenceline depicting its many environmental benefits.

"It engaged local residents and schools in the project, promoting environmental awareness and education."
